

#### **Greetings from Pastor Kristine Isder**

#### **Up and Down Religion**

Some religions teach that we need to do something to work our way up to God. That fits with our human nature of wanting to "do" something. We are used to taking matters into our own hands, checking things off the list to accomplish a task or project.

As Lutherans, we believe it's not a ladder we can climb. We can't work our way up to God. God is like a big down arrow – God comes down. The arrow only goes one way – down. No matter how hard we try, no matter what we accomplish, we can't work our way up to God. The chasm is too wide.

God comes down to us. God comes down the ladder we can't go up.

At our Fall Theological Conference, the presenter worked through the Augsburg Confession, the basis of our Lutheran faith.

"But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

This is the heart of the gospel: even when it is impossible for us, it is possible for God. Jesus doesn't love us because we deserve it or because we've done enough – Jesus loves us precisely in our failure as sinners.

We approach life as a series of achievements. In a world measured by merit, we seek assurance through action, always asking, "What must I do?" This is the human condition – trying to secure our future, striving to justify ourselves through effort. However, true flourishing comes not from achievement but from a life grounded in grace and relationship with God.

"But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ – by grace you have been saved. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God." (Ephesians 2:4-5, 8)

When confronted with grace's radical call, we are stunned, for it dismantles the systems of merit we trust. Grace invites surrender, and we flinch, unable to let go.

No one can enter God's kingdom by their own effort. None of us can meet the law's demands.

Our striving for eternal life only reveals our inability to save ourselves. The harder we try, the more we fail. The more we fail, the harder we try. We are trapped in a cycle of merit and self-justification.

Despite our failure to meet the law's demands, and our inability to save ourselves, Jesus looks at us and loves us.

God sees our brokenness, our reluctance to surrender, and our weakness, and still chooses to love us. Grace does not wait for us to be perfect; it comes to us in our imperfection and accomplishes what we cannot, making us right with God.

"But God proves his love for us

*in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.*" (Romans 5:8)

The fruit of faith is gifted to us by the Holy Spirit.

Our striving for eternal life only eals our inability to save The Holy Spirit inspires us to release what we cannot hold onto and instead place our

> trust in God's grace. As the Holy Spirit's presence works in our lives and bears fruit through our actions, there *are* things for us mortals to do.

We are invited to join in Jesus' mission, not because of what we have done, but because of what God has done for us and continues to do.

This promise transforms how we live in the present. We live generously, no longer striving to secure our future, but trusting in God's abundance. And while we may face challenges or loss, we are sustained by the hope of the kingdom, where grace reigns and God's love knows no limits.

Where we can't do enough, when we are in bondage to our sin, addicted to our wealth and

comfort, where we are too selfish, too curved in on ourselves, when it is impossible for us to save ourselves, God looks at us with love and gives us grace.

We are promised an inheritance far greater than anything we could achieve on our own. It is not the result of our merit or effort, but the gift of God's grace.

The good news of the Gospel is that it's not up to us, but up to God, and for God, all things are possible. God comes down to us because we can't go up to God.



#### **Hurricane Response**

In late September, Hurricane Helene hit the coast of Florida as a Category 4 hurricane and moved inland, leaving devastation throughout the southeastern United States. The storm caused dangerous flooding, washing away whole towns and roads, leaving millions of people without power, and driving thousands from their homes.

Hurricane Milton hit Florida on Oct. 9, bringing heavy rain, winds and tornadoes. This storm was particularly devastating because many communities were still

#### ELCA Conference of Bishops Emphasizes the Need to Speak the Truth

The Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) met Sept. 24-28 at the Lutheran Center in Chicago. The conference, an advisory body of the ELCA, comprises 65 synod bishops, the presiding bishop and the secretary.

In key business, the conference issued a statement stressing the need to speak the truth:

In a perfect garden, created by God for the sake of humanity, evil entered in the form of deception and lies. Christians refer to this story, found in the biblical book of Genesis, as the *fall of humanity*. This foray into human sin began when Adam and Eve, the first humans created in the image of God, were deceived.

Humans have contended with the powers of deception ever since.

Yet we are a people who know and proclaim the power of God at work in the world. We proclaim the power of Jesus Christ, God in the flesh, the one who said, "I am the way, the truth and the life" (John 14:6).

We know that the power of truth is greater than the power of deceit.

We, the members of the Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, speak with one voice to condemn the hateful, deceptive, violent speech that has too readily found a place in our national discourse. We lament the ways this language has led to hate-fueled action.

We refuse to accept the ongoing normalization of lies and deceit.

We recommit ourselves to speaking the truth and pointing to the one who is truth. We find courage in our collegiality and implore the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, as well as our partners and friends, to join us as we:

- Pledge to be vigilant guardians of truth, refusing to perpetuate lies or half-truths that further corrode the fabric of our society.
- Commit to rigorous fact-checking, honoring God's command to "test everything; hold fast to what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21).
- Reject the use of humor that normalizes falsehood, remembering that our speech should "always be gracious" (Colossians 4:6).
- Boldly advocate for the marginalized and oppressed, emulating Christ's love for the least among us.
- Courageously interrupt hate speech, standing firm in the knowledge that all are created in God's image.
- Lean in with curiosity, engage with those who think differently and "put the best construction on our neighbor's action" (Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment).
- Amplify voices of truth.

Emboldened by the Holy Spirit, may we resist deception and lift up the truth that all members of humanity are created in the image of God.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with us all as we respond to the Spirit's invitation into this intentional commitment against deception and for truth.
