LIVE IN LOVE

"Live in love, as Christ loved us." Ephesians 5:2 (NRSV)

Other translations of this verse: "Walk in the way of love, just as

Christ loved us." (NIV)

"Live a life filled with love, following the example of Christ."

(NLT)

Every person is created in the image of God, and when we live in love we become "imitators of God" (Ephesians 5:1).

We are urged to love each other with that same love that we have received from God.

God's presence in the world is made known through the love of God's people.

There's a necessary connection between claiming to love God, and claiming to have experienced God's love, and demonstrating that we love our neighbor. This connection is repeated several times in the Bible.

"Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law." (Romans 13:8)

"Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law." (Romans 13:10)

"For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself."" (Galatians 5:14)

"The only thing that counts is faith working through love." (Galatians 5:6)

"You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (James 2:8)

In 1 Corinthians 13 Paul wrote that the "greatest gift" is love,

without which we are merely a noisy nuisance.

"Those who say, 'I love God,' and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also." (1 John 4:20-21)

Jesus said that loving your neighbor is the greatest commandment.

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

In addition to being repeated throughout the New Testament,

this commandment was also repeated by Christian writers in the centuries after the first believers.

"Our care for the derelict and our active love," writes the African Tertullian, "have become our distinctive sign... See, they say, how they love one another and how ready they are to die for each other."

"Blessed is the one who can love all people equally," said Maximos the Confessor, "always thinking good of everyone."

John the evangelist, who wrote the gospel of John and the book of Revelation, is reported to have preached at Ephesus into his nineties.

By that time, John was so feeble that he had to be carried into the church on a stretcher. When he could no longer preach a normal sermon, he would lean up on one elbow.

The only thing he said was, "Little children, love one another." People would then carry him back out of the church.

This continued for weeks.

Every week he repeated his onesentence sermon: "Little children, love one another."

Weary of hearing the same sermon, the congregation finally asked, "Master, why do you always say this?"

"Because" John replied, "it is the Lord's command, and if this only is done, it is enough."

The farmer-poet Wendell Berry writes:

"I know that I have life only insofar as I have love.
I have no love except it come from Thee.
Help me, please, to carry this candle against the wind."

Living Faithfully in this Election Season

Dear friends - If the news these days is giving you whiplash, you are not alone! We have entered an election season that seems more contentious and emotional than ever before. Relationship tensions across our communities and congregations, and within families are strong.

So how do live together as the church in these times? How do we regard one another?

Remember that:

The people with whom we worship are beloved children of God, each one created in the image of God. (Genesis 1)

Jesus Christ has made us one. We are together in Christ, not alone. It's about unity, not uniformity.

God gave us two ears and one mouth. Listening to others is a valued and sometimes learned practice. Olympic athletes practice their skills. We as Christians get to practice love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. (Galatians 5)

Things we post on social media are there forever. Be intentional about how you engage in conversations in posts. It is far easier to share memes that demonize others, rather than those that exhibit kindness.

As the ELCA, we have plenty of resources that can be helpful. And now, especially as the ELCA is suddenly named nationally, from a variety of perspectives. A primary document is: Being A Public Church.pdf (elca.org).

Another resource document is: Political Activity and Tax Status.pdf (elca.org).

Short story: because of our tax status, neither synods nor congregations may support or endorse candidates for office, but they are permitted to engage in issue advocacy and neutral political activity (e.g., nonpartisan registration drives, serving as a polling location, etc.). Pastors, church employees, and church members can endorse or support candidates, but only if it is clear that they are acting in their personal capacity and not in their capacity as leaders or employees of their congregations or as representing the whole congregation.

As rostered ministers discuss in boundaries training, this can be blurry because many pastors serve in areas where they are always recognized and greeted as "Pastor." So, please think twice before putting your pastor on the spot. Pastors and churches cannot endorse a candidate from the pulpit or on the congregation's Facebook page, or place a candidate's political advertising on the congregation's lawn.

Prayers for this season from the Faithful Living in Society section of the All Creation Sings hymnal (page 50):

Sovereign God, your Son Jesus lived within the structures of society even as he spoke truth to those in power and challenged systems of oppression. Empower us to be coura-

geous disciples and responsible citizens. Grant that our life in the public realm be grounded in love for our neighbors, care for the most vulnerable in our midst, and respect for the common life we share, following the example of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

God, our gracious giver, your Son Jesus taught us that where our treasure is there our hearts will be also. Teach us to love people more than money, relationships more than things, and you above all, that the way we live will reflect what we truly value and believe. We ask this in the name of Jesus, who emptied himself in love for us, and now reigns with you and the Holy Spirit forever and ever. Amen.
